This letter is in reference to the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity application for Three Rivers Park District regional trail improvements project in Hennepin County. This project is a locally led project. The project will construct 7 miles of new regional trail, reconstruct 8 miles of existing (mostly end-of-life sidewalk/trail facilities) to meet regional trail standards, and construct one new grade-separated crossing. These improvements will facilitate completion of the park district's long-planned multimodal connections in the region by providing critical links in the regional trail network, reconstructing trail sections that are beyond their useful life, incorporating ADA improvements and ensuring safer crossings of major barriers.

Currently the total project cost estimate is \$27.8 million. Three Rivers Park District has identified \$5.6 million for this project. MnDOT currently does not have this project included in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) or funding identified in MnDOT's 10-year Capital Highway Investment Plan (CHIP). It is MnDOT's assumption at this time that the local agency will be responsible for delivery costs and funding gaps. This project is planned for construction in 2026.

MnDOT looks forward to continued cooperation with Three Rivers Park District as this effort moves forward to improve this transportation need.
