Dear Secretary Buttigieg,

I write on behalf of the City of Madison and its application to the Department of Transportation (DOT) seeking Implementation and Planning and Demonstration funding through the Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant Program. The requested funds would help to implement priority initiatives identified in the Vision Zero Action Plan as well as further planning efforts to prevent deaths and serious injuries on local roads.

The City of Madison received Supplemental Action Plan funding under the inaugural round of the SS4A program to support planning needs identified in its Vision Zero Action Plan and Complete Green Streets Guide. Those activities included updating the City's Pedestrian, Bike, and School Travel Plans; evaluating intersections where crashes involved pedestrians and bicyclists; and integrating post-crash safety planning into Vision Zero policy. Additional funding under the program would allow the City to build upon these efforts and further its goal of eliminating all fatalities and severe injuries from traffic collisions by 2035. Madison intends to fund a suite of safety projects if awarded under the FY 2023 SS4A Program.

Implementation projects would include corridor safety improvements, system-wide safety enhancements focused on shared-use path crossings and intersections on the High Injury Network that are also part of the Metro Transit route system, and addressing impaired driving in partnership with Madison-Dane County Public Health. Demonstration funding would be utilized to deploy painted pavement art at various locations to slow driving and increase pedestrian yielding; evaluate street closures near schools during arrival and dismissal to improve safety for students and increase walking and biking; and improve safety for drivers ages 65 and older as well as teen drivers. Finally, supplemental planning funding would permit the City to conduct improvement trials and evaluation on priority corridors, update its High Injury Network map, and develop an equitable Vision Zero engagement plan.

I support this and other efforts to ensure safe, healthy, and equitable mobility for all Dane County roadway users. I ask that this application be given full and fair consideration. Public Health Madison and Dane County's (PHMDC) mission is to work with the community to enhance, protect, and promote the health of the environment and the well-being of all people. A recent report from the Dane County Traffic Safety Commission noted that there were 80 automobile crashes between January and June 2022 involving alcohol, 41% more than the five-year average. Of those, 16 were fatal, including 11 that involved drivers whose blood alcohol levels exceeded the legal limit of 0.08%. PHMDC is committed to helping create safe streets and roads in the City of Madison by implementing public health alcohol harm reduction strategies within the context of this grant application.
